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## **An Assessment Of Risk Behaviors**

Effective assessment of high-risk behaviors involves collecting data to quantify substance misuse, risky sexual behavior, crime, or violent behavior among students, along with the related primary and secondary harms caused by those behaviors to students, faculty, staff, and the surrounding community.

High Risk Behaviors High Risk Behaviors are often impulsive and damaging, but can be seen as a cry for help when emotions become intolerable. High-risk behaviors include physical self-harm, impulsive, and reckless behaviors. Physical self-harm can be cutting, pulling out hair, burning, scratching, or any other bodily harm.

Risk Assessment Tool for Behavioral Crisis. Utilize risk assessments applicable to the general population. Take into account how the patient's developmental disabilities affect both risks and protective factors. Note whether recent changes have occurred in any risk or protective factors. Flag all areas where there are risk issues - also consider factors that may protect from harm.

## **IDD Toolkit-Risk Assessment Tool for Behavioral Crisis**

MANY YOUTH REPORT THE PRESENCE OF FACTORS ASSOCIATED WITH LOWER RATES OF RISK BEHAVIORS. Factors such as academic achievement, exposure to positive public health messaging, school-connectedness, and a close relationship with a parent or caregiver have been recognized as

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potential protective factors.

Using a screening tool allows risky behaviors to be reviewed before talking with teens so that the provider can gather resources.

## **Adolescent Risk Screening**

The Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System (YRBSS) monitors six types of health-risk behaviors that contribute to the leading causes of death and disability among youth and adults, including behaviors that contribute to unintentional injuries and violence; sexual behaviors that contribute to unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease, including HIV infection; alcohol and other drug use; tobacco; unhealthy dietary behaviors; inadequate physical activity.

## **YRBSS | Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System | Data ...**

Assessment: comprehensive screening tools tailored by age for the most relevant risks, reading level, and brain development. Discussion: health education based on behavior change methodology shown to be most effective at reducing youth risk.

## **The Rapid Adolescent Prevention Screening© (RAAPS)**

The 225-item instrument provides an in-depth assessment of drug involvement, including drug use frequency and drug use consequences and benefits, as well as the major risk factors associated with such involvement (e.g., deviance, peer influence).

## **Assessment of Alcohol and Other Drug Use Behaviors**

Risk culture is the “set of encouraged and acceptable behaviors, discussions, decisions and attitudes toward taking and managing risk within an institution.” Developed in conjunction with research Protiviti conducted with the Risk Management Association [1] , this definition applies to all organizations, whether public or private, for-profit or not-for-profit.
