The Apocalypse of Pseudo-Methodius was translated into Greek and Latin within fifty years of its composition, and in those languages the book spread to Byzantium and Europe. Among the works it affected was the so-called Primary Chronicle of Novgorod, a monastic chronicle written at the monastery of Caves in the first quarter of the twelfth century.

The Apocalypse of Pseudo-Methodius is a 7th-century apocalypse that shaped the eschatological imagination of Christendom throughout the Mediæval period. The work was written in Syriac in the late 7th century, in reaction to the Islamic conquest of the Near East, and is falsely attributed to the 4th-century Church Father Methodius of Olympus (†311).

The Apocalypse of the Pseudo-Methodius Although relatively little known today the Apocalypse of the Pseudo-Methodius was the equivalent of a bestseller of its day. Supposedly written by a fourth century Christian holy man called Methodius, the text was likely composed originally in Syriac around 690-92 CE based on various other similar texts.

An apocalyptic pseudo-prophecy [citation needed] exists among the Sibylline Oracles, which was attributed to the Tiburtine Sibyl. Its earliest version may date from the fourth century, but in the form that it survives today it was written in the early eleventh century, and has been influenced by the Apocalypse of Pseudo-Methodius .
