The best way to help your baby is to take care of yourself. Regular medical and dental attention and good nutrition directly benefits both you and your baby's health. Plenty of rest and moderate exercise will help ease the physical stresses of pregnancy.

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Once you're home from the hospital, learn how put your baby to sleep safely and protect him from dangers, like sudden infant death syndrome (also called SIDS). As your baby grows, he gets medical checkups, vaccinations and his health care provider checks that he's meeting developmental milestones. 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Hold your baby upright to feed him or her. Do not prop your baby's bottle. Your baby could choke while you are not watching, especially in a moving vehicle. Do not use a microwave to heat your baby's bottle. The milk or formula will not heat evenly and will have spots that are very hot. Your baby's face or mouth could be burned.
