Pediatric Critical Care CPT ® codes 99293-99294 are used to report services provided by a physician directing the care of a critically ill neonate/infant 29 days through 24 months of age and are reported once per day, per patient.

Pediatric Critical Care Defined Pediatric critical care codes are reported per day. If a provider from the same group or specialty rounds on the patient later in the day, he or she cannot bill another critical care code for a patient younger than 5 years of age. The applicable code sets include: Neonatal critical care 28 days or younger

One coding myth about critical care that should be immediately dispelled is that critical care always means care performed in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), pediatric ICU (PICU), or the ICU. In fact, "critical care is not determined by the location in which the care is being delivered," according to Miller.

### **Pediatric Coding Alert Critical Care: Consider Clinical ...**

CPT code 99291 is used to report the first 30-74 minutes of critical care on a given date. It should be used only once per date. CPT code 99292 is used to report additional block (s) of time of up to 30 minutes each beyond the first 74 minutes of critical care. (Example: For critical care time of 35 minutes, report 99291 x 1 only.

### **ACEP // Critical Care FAQ**

Coding Corner addresses the continuing changes in coding and billing. Neonatal and pediatric critical care coding guidelines have been modified over the years, but the definitions remain the same. The patient must meet the same clinical criteria as for the adult critical care codes 99291 and 99292.
