Speech and Swallowing. About 75 percent of people with PD experience changes in speech and voice at some time during the course of the disease. These changes usually come on gradually and can vary from mild to severe. Communication is a vital part of daily life and extends beyond speech and voice abilities.

In Parkinson's, swallowing problems may cause coughing, choking or throat clearing when eating or drinking. Some people may feel like the food is getting "stuck" as it goes down. To

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evaluate swallowing problems, doctors may order a test that takes x-rays while you swallow foods and liquids of different consistencies.

When you eat: Lessen distractions. Stay focused on eating and drinking. Don't talk with food in your mouth . Eat slowly. Cut your food into small pieces, and chew it thoroughly. Don't try to eat more than 1/2 teaspoon at a time. Keep in mind that you may need to swallow two or three times per bite ...

Swallowing and Cough Just as the muscles of speech and voice are affected by Parkinsonism, the swallowing and cough muscles are also greatly affected by the disease. In fact, some claim that 100% of people with Parkinson's disease will develop some sort of dysphagia (swallowing difficulty).

Parkinson's can also cause problems in the tongue muscles. The tongue is important in swallowing. We use it to move food around and push it to the back of the mouth to trigger the swallowing reflexes. Parkinson's can also impair the reflexes that protect our windpipe from food and drink.

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While few studies focus on communication and swallowing in the early stage of Parkinson's disease, the findings suggest a positive trend for intensive treatments targeting underlying physiology (e.g., vocal dysfunction, oropharyngeal swallowing).

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If speech and communication becomes severely impaired in the later stages of Parkinson's, the speech pathologist can also help to identify special pieces of equipment that might be useful such as voice amplifiers or electronic communication aids.
