An employer is legally obliged to send an employee a written statement of employment within two months of starting work.

When you employ staff, there are employer obligations you need to meet. As an employer, you are required to make deductions from your employees earning a wage, salary or schedular payments. This is known as PAYE (pay as

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you earn). You must deduct and pay PAYE tax on your employees' behalf by the due dates.
