Thomas believed both were necessary—or, rather, that the confluence of both was necessary—for one to obtain true knowledge of God. Thomas blended Greek philosophy and Christian doctrine by suggesting that rational thinking and the study of nature, like revelation, were valid ways to understand truths pertaining to God.

Augustine himself, in the passage from The City of God cited above, clearly foresaw a danger in philosophy. The defining of this danger is a principal task of political philosophy itself. Augustine, of course, wrote not as some stranger to philosophy. Very early in our literature he was aware of the limits of philosophy.

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But this conflict gave rise to the most complete political theory of universal and secular empire formulated in the medieval West, by the Italian poet and philosopher Dante Alighieri. In *De monarchia* (c. 1313), still in principle highly relevant, Dante insists that only through universal peace can human faculties come to their full compass.
