Pathological demand avoidance (PDA) is a term coined by Elizabeth Newson in the 1980s to describe children putatively within the spectrum of pervasive developmental disorders who exhibited an unusual pattern of behaviour [1].

The 'Extreme Demand Avoidance Questionnaire' (EDA-Q) was developed to measure behaviours reported in clinical accounts of extreme/'pathological' demand avoidance (PDA). The questionnaire allowed these traits to be measured consistently for research purposes. The EDA-Q should not be considered a diagnostic test.

Pathological Demand Avoidance Syndrome (PDA) was first described in the 1980s in the UK, by Elizabeth Newson, and is an Autistic Spectrum Disorder related to, but significantly different from, 'standard' autism and Asperger's syndrome, and is increasingly becoming recognised as part of the autism spectrum.

Pathological (or extreme) demand avoidance is a term sometimes applied to complex behaviours in children within—or beyond—autism spectrum disorder. The use of pathological demand avoidance as a diagnosis has, at times, led to altered referral practice and misunderstandings between professionals and the families of patients.
